Marriage—Who's In Charge?

Are you sure I'm going to say "husbands"? You'd be mistaken.

The truth is that God is supposed to be in charge in every human relation and institution. Sadly that's not always the case, but that's the way it's supposed to be—and will be in the Christian home.

Just like God has made the nighttime sky as a wonder to behold; just like He has created the physical universe with its marvelous, predictable order; and just like the Lord is the designer behind the intricately complex ecosystems that ecologists work so hard to preserve: God has a perfect plan and order for your (and every) marriage.

The problem is that we don't believe it. "If there's a chance that I won't get what I want under God's plan," we think, "then it couldn't be right." "What if things don't go my way? What if God's plan requires me to do things I don't want to do? Oh the oppression...Oh, the slavery...the sadness...the despair! REBELLION!" And we hear a faint whisper in our hearts growing louder, "Has God said...?" (See Genesis 3:1).

And at that moment, when we begin to deviate from God's plan and the promises that we made, chaos and disorder awakens.

God's plan and design for marriage is probably best expressed in Paul's teaching in Ephesians 5:22-33. In a nutshell it amounts to...

- Wives submit to your husbands as you would to the Lord
- Husbands love your wives...
 - ✓As Christ loved the church (providing for all her needs and acting in her best interests)
 - ✓ As a man loves and takes care of his own body
- Take the relationship of Christ and the church as a model for understanding

So, instead of arguing about who's wearing the pants in the family, stop, take a deep breath and realize that God is supposed to be in charge. Ask Him about the budget, about sex, about in-laws, about children, and about all the rest. It will make out of your union a marriage that will rival the Milky Way in breath-taking beauty and majesty.

THE DISCIPLINE OF CHILDREN

This topic, of course, is often a very sensitive one. But let's acknowledge that it is one of the hardest jobs you'll ever do, and that we could all use a little encouragement and few pointers on it from time to time. With that in mind, may I offer a few ideas culled from Biblical principles, a few observations over the years, and a few years of experience?

How do I discipline my children?

- → Love them—The world may think that love is contrary to discipline, but it is really the essence of it. I'm not talking about the indulgent, so-called love some parents display, "because I just love them too much to tell them no." I'm talking about a love that is both tough and tender, and which has the child's best long-term interest at heart. Proverbs says, "He who withholds his rod hates his son, But he who loves him disciplines him diligently", Proverbs 13:24.
- ➡ Fairly—Both children and adults respond very well to fairness. What they dislike are rules that seem to be made up and change as we go, and enforcement that favors one person over another. How is "fair" applied? Fair is about being clear about the rules and consequences. It isn't fair to say, "You should have known better," about something they've never been told about. They're kids, and they very often don't know better until they are told. And fair is about dealing consequences to every "culprit" evenly, age appropriately, and without favoritism.
- ➤ Consistently—Inconsistency is any parent's most damaging and most alluring form of self-sabotage. It's so easy and tempting to let discipline slide "this once". We get tired, we don't want to be the "bad guy" again, and "I'm too busy to deal with this right now" are just a few of the many roads that lead to inconsistency. Once is bad enough, but once usually leads to twice and five and ten and more times. Inconsistency is read by kids as "it's possible to get away with this".
- Rationally—Sadly, discipline is often dealt out when the parent is angry; and it's difficult to be both angry and fair at the same time. That's why it's a good idea to call a parental meeting to sketch out the rules of the house and the appropriate consequences, while you're calm and rational. After you have your list, share it with the kids—infractions and consequences—for discussion and questions, so you know that everyone "got the memo". Post them on the fridge; and next time an

infraction of the house rules is committed, everyone can refer to the posted rules. It needs to be discipline, not revenge.

- ➡ In keeping with the "crime"—Consequences are best crafted, when they have a direct connection to the "crime". "Late for dinner" consequences could be could cold left overs, or no dinner at all. "Destruction of property" consequences could be paying it back by docking allowance until paid for. You can't always find a close match, but you get the idea.
- As close to the time of the "crime" as possible—
 The more immediate the consequences for breaking the rules, the stronger the impression of the discipline is. Don't say, "Wait until your dad or mom get home," unless you've already disciplined the child yourself. "Now" is always the best time to discipline; "later" is usually too late to have maximum effectiveness.
- ➡ With an explanation—Yes, you've already explained the rules of the house to them before, but with every infraction needs to come another explanation of the rule. As the children get older, answering the nuances of the rule and explaining "why" becomes increasingly important. Be patient, be firm, and be clear that it isn't a negotiation, just a reiteration of the rules.
- With an assurance of love—Never leave the child with the idea that you don't love him/her. Of course, every child will say, "You don't love me!"—you can't change this about human nature—but you can always tell them you love them and give them a hug. It is never, ever fair to threaten a child (whether plainly said or implied) to withhold affection and love. Never.
- Under God's direction—Children are a stewardship from the Lord. To be faithful to that stewardship, we should raise them God's way. "Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord." Ephesians 6:4.

Parental disciplining is hard, thankless work for first couple of decades. But like so many truly good things we can continue to practice it in a godly fashion with endurance; if we focus on the outcome—children who are mature, hardworking, godly, respectful, spiritual, independent, self-disciplined, and ready to enter a difficult and challenging world. With God's help, you can do this!
